


Things to do on your own

The Great Salt Lake is the largest natural lake west of the Mississippi River. At the current level, the Great Salt Lake is approximately 75 miles long and

about 35 miles wide. The Great Salt Lake is more than twice as salty as the ocean. Located in several wide flat basins, a slight rise in water level expands the surface area of the lake considerably. The first scientific measurements were taken in 1849
